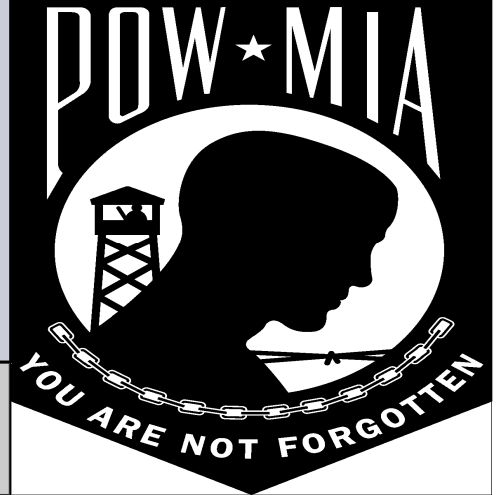

AMERICANS ACCOUNTED FOR: There has been no published change to the number still unaccounted-for since the April 10th Update. For various reasons, including wishes of the family, DoD announcements are often delayed far beyond the ID dates, and others are likely pending. Several of those named this year were examples of how remains repatriated many years ago can now be identified using contemporary science that wasn't available in earlier years. The number of Americans now listed by DoD as returned and identified since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975 is 956. Another 63 US personnel, recovered by the US and identified before the end of the war, bring the total of US personnel accounted for from the Vietnam War to 1,019. Of the 1,627 still unaccounted-for, 90% were lost in Vietnam or in areas of Cambodia and Laos under Vietnam's wartime control: Vietnam-1,269 (VN-467, VS-802); Laos-302; Cambodia-49; PRC territorial waters-7. These numbers occasionally fluctuate due to investigations resulting in changed locations of loss.) The League seeks the fullest possible accounting for those still missing and repatriation of all recoverable remains.

NEW DPAA DIRECTOR ANNOUNCED: LTG Mike Linnington, USA, retired from active duty on June 17th, has been announced as the new permanent Director, Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA). He previously served as the Military Deputy to the Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness. While always cautious to not overstate support for people named to positions of responsibility in the POW/MIA accounting mission, it is no overstatement to recognize his outstanding background. LTG Linnington was born in Cape May, NJ. He graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1980 and was commissioned an Infantry Officer. His civilian education includes a BS from the US Military Academy at West Point, NY, and an MS in Applied Mathematics from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, NY. His military education includes the Infantry Officer's Basic and Advanced Courses at Ft Benning, Georgia, US Army Command and General Staff College at Ft Leavenworth, KS, and the National War College in Washington, DC where he earned a Masters Degree in National Security Strategy. His 33 year active duty career includes duties in key command and staff positions at Ft Ord, CA; Ft Riley, KS; West Berlin (Divided), Germany; multiple assignments at Fort Campbell, KY; the Republic of Korea, and several tours in Washington, DC (Army and Joint Staffs). From Jun '02 to Jun '04, then COL Linnington commanded the 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault) where he deployed both in Operation Enduring Freedom (Afghanistan) and Operation Iraqi Freedom. After selection to Flag Rank, LTG Linnington held positions of responsibility at Ft Benning, GA (Deputy Commanding General), West Point, NY (Commandant of Cadets), Kabul, Afghanistan (International Security Assistance Force), and in Washington, DC

(Commander, US Army Military District of Washington). LTG Linnington assumed his duties as Military Deputy to the Under Secretary of Defense (Personnel & Readiness) in July 2013, the position from which he retired on June 17, 2015. LTG Linnington's wife of 32 years is the former Brenda Zachary of Salinas, CA. They have two children, a son, Army CAPT Michael, and a daughter, Tracy, a Program Manager, Navy Federal Credit Union; she and her husband are expecting the Linnington's first grandchild soon.

Chairman's Comment: I attended LTG Linnington's retirement on June 17th and had talked with him in his POW/MIA advisory role to Under Secretary of Defense for Policy Christine Wormuth, VADM Mike Franken and Maj Gen Kelly McKeague relating to the "complete reorganization" of the entire community. As a result, I can attest to the esteem in which he is held by a broad cross-section of military and civilian personnel. From the lowest level to those at the top, all seem to genuinely like and admire him. LTG Linnington will be sworn in on Monday, June 22nd, as the civilian Senior Executive Service Level 3 Director. It is my hope, prayer and expectation that he will work to achieve the objectives we share, and do so with honor, integrity, humility, dedication, energy and determination. That is all we can ask. All we should expect is his very best effort, and we do, but he will also need our full support and that of the currently demoralized former JPAC and DPMO workforce. Therefore, we, the Vietnam War families and our many concerned Veteran groups, individual Veterans and civilian supporters, ask all POW/MIA-related personnel – especially the experienced civilian core – to set aside the countless obstacles and justifiable frustrations you have endured over far too many years and focus on what is possible with our new DPAA Director. I believe DPAA truly can become the accounting agency we all have sorely missed since 1992, a cohesive, interagency US Government priority that will, with the support of all, achieve the fullest possible accounting, the League's longstanding, entirely reasonable objective.

Perspectives: Reducing Suicide Among Women Veterans Begins With Changing Military Culture

In response to the June 8, 2015 article in the LA Times written by Alan Zarembo, detailing the staggering suicide rate of female military veterans, I feel like I owe our society straight talk. Women veterans don't want XY-sex determination to matter, but military culture seems averse to this idea. Advocates for women veterans have had to champion female-specific requirements, from body armor to maternity leave, all while trying not to lose ground in debunking misperceptions regarding their inferiority to the men in their units.

Chromosome pairing didn't matter though when Sergeant Leigh Ann Hester of the 617th Military Police Company, a National Guard unit out of Richmond, Kentucky, was pinned down by enemy fire after her convoy was ambushed on March 20 when anti-Iraqi fighters. Hester purportedly led her team through the "kill zone" and into a flanking position, where she assaulted a trench line with grenades and M203 grenade-launcher rounds. She was credited with clearing two trenches and killing three insurgents. Something tells me her anatomical makeup had no bearing on her valor, sacrifice, and commitment that day. At least there's no mention of it in her Silver Star citation. Nor was there a mention of this in the Silver Star citation for Army Specialist Monica Lin Brown, who saved the lives of fellow soldiers after a roadside bomb tore through a convoy of Humvees in the eastern Paktia province in April 2007.

Veterans who happen to be female faced a gross lack of preparedness by the Department of Defense, the Department of Veterans Affairs, and local communities when they returned from battle. This lack of preparation continues as the government has yet to do serious studies on the impact military service on female-specific issues or the competence of VA clinicians to address these issues. One might conclude that our only hope lies in women veteran advocacy groups, whom you would expect to fight for these types of studies and a review of inequitable training standards. Advocates who debunk creeping myths that "moms" and their propensity for suffering Post Traumatic Stress or debilitating pain or family problems or hormone complications or other female-specific "issues" need not apply. How has that worked out so far?

The reality is our society does not appear ready to see a woman who served in the same light as a male veteran. The men are the heroes who have been honored publicly and the women are the rescued who served as administrative personal or "place holders" for the real military. Case in point, Google the name Jessica Lynch. She was an Army Private First Class who was captured by the enemy when her convoy was ambushed by Iraqi forces during the battle of Nasiriyah. The headlines read, "Jessica Lynch: scared when rescue began" or "Jessica Lynch: Iraq still haunts my dreams 10 years after" or "Jessica Lynch: I was raped." Headlines not typically associated with male combatants. But one need only read quotes from Lynch herself, and you will see that even she downplayed her combat role in the experience. She testified in front of Congress that she had never fired her weapon, her rifle jammed, and that she had been knocked unconscious when her vehicle crashed. When asked about her status as a hero, she stated, "That wasn't me. I'm not about to take credit for something I didn't do...I'm just a survivor." Even if we accept the accuracy of her account, she still had more heroism in her left pinkie than the scores of men and women who'd never worn a uniform or faced a deadly enemy. Lynch's case drew more detractors who questioned the narrative, one she did not advance and went out of her way to minimize, instead of recognizing the profound price she paid for raising her right hand to defend the country after the attacks on September 11, 2001

This Week in History July 1-7, 1968

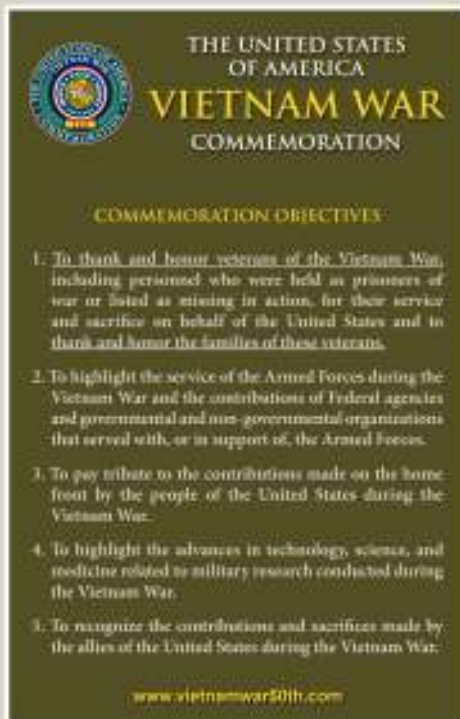
Operation Thor, the joint mission to attack and destroy North Vietnamese long range artillery facing the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ), coast artillery batteries, antiaircraft positions, and staging areas for infiltration, supplies and transport, took place July 1-7, 1968. The targets were in the Cap Mui Lay sector, the furthest southern coastal area of North Vietnam. It ran up the coast from the southern edge of the DMZ for almost nine miles and inland just more than 15 miles.

Preparation for Operation THOR called for the movement of artillery batteries to prepared temporary positions. U.S. Marine and Army artillery included three Army Battalions of 175mm guns and 8 inch howitzers, and six Marine batteries of 155mm and 8 inch guns and howitzers. Naval gunfire support came from two cruisers and six destroyers.

United States Air Force aircraft included the entire 3rd Air Division of B-52Hs based on Guam, five Tactical Fighter Wings, two Tactical Reconnaissance Wings, and light spotter aircraft from the 20th Tactical Air Support Squadron. The First Marine Air Wing employed consisted of five Attack Fighter Squadrons, five Attack Squadrons, and a Reconnaissance Squadron. Lastly the U. S. Navy provided 13 fighter and attack squadrons flying from four aircraft carriers. Extensive target lists were compiled ahead of the operation.

In the first phase of Operation THOR, 664 U.S. aircraft and 114 B-52 sorties attacked in concert with the Navy cruisers and destroyers. These attacks, lasting two days, destroyed and damaged enemy installations. Damage to antiaircraft and coastal batteries enabled spotter aircraft and naval vessels to approach targets closer than previously possible. By the beginning of Phase Two, the third day of Operation THOR, improved reconnaissance had enlarged the target list. Artillery of the land forces and the Navy's cruisers and destroyers continued to fire against North Vietnamese antiaircraft positions. By the beginning of Phase Three, light Marine and Army Spotter aircraft were able to operate well into North Vietnamese airspace. Their presence allowed engagement of more targets with greater accuracy. Observers reported that little or no farming or other domestic activity was occurring in the Cap Mui Lay sector. Observers on the ground in the air and at sea recorded the impact of the strikes. Over 600 secondary fires and explosions were observed. The operation ended the night of July 7.

By the end of the mission, 8,363 tons of bombs were dropped and 42,209 shells were fired. One Army soldier and one Air Force pilot were killed. Six aircraft were lost. An estimated 789 antiaircraft and 179 artillery pieces or positions were destroyed along with other installations and material. The long term impact of this short campaign was that American observation aircraft were able to fly over the region, and antiaircraft fire was reduced by 80% until overflights of the North were banned by President Johnson on November 1, 1968.
